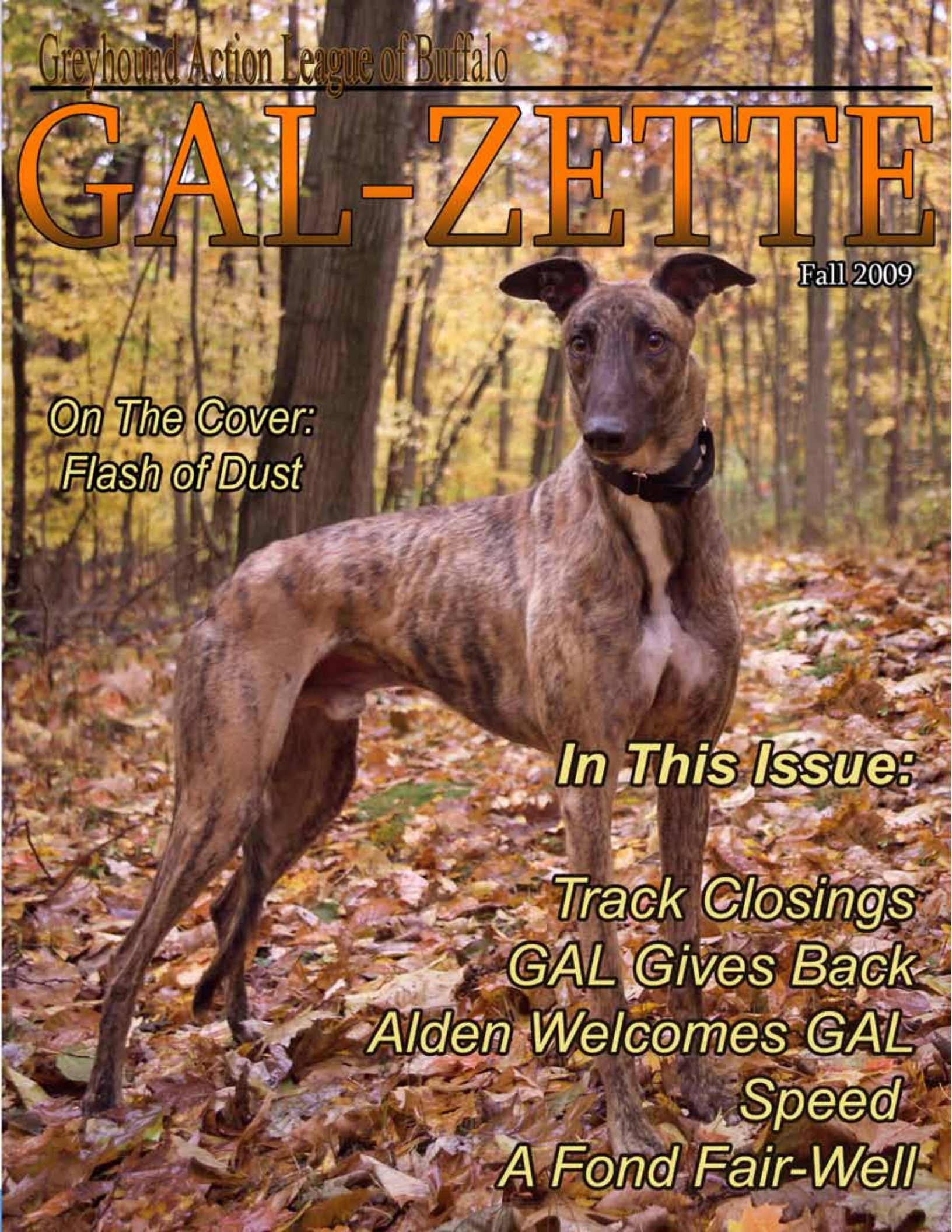

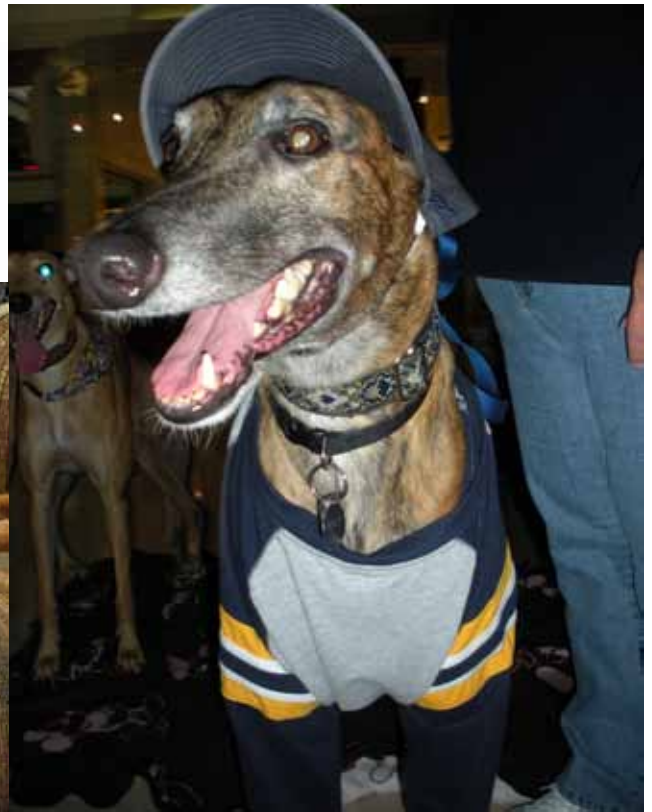
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GREYHOUND ACTION LEAGUE OF BUFFALO GAL-ZETTE

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At the end of this year, four greyhound racing tracks will cease operations permanently. These closings, combined with regular seasonal shut-downs, are testing the capacities of greyhound adoption groups across the country.

In Arizona, the Phoenix Greyhound Park will close after several years of declining revenue. One of three tracks remaining in the state, many of the greyhounds will be moved to other tracks, and efforts have been increased to try to accommodate the adoptions of the rest.

A Ballot Question (referendum) in 2008 put an end to racing in Massachusetts beginning in 2010. Two tracks, Raynham and Wonderland, will close in January. A number of these dogs will race elsewhere, many in Florida.

Most relevant to our organization is the closing of the Dairyland track in Kenosha, Wisconsin. Opened in 1991, it is the last of five tracks in the state. It also has experienced a drop in revenue, forcing the closure.

News of this type can set some folks in panic mode, posting inaccurate information and numbers causing more panic. Adoption organizations that have worked through other track closings were already in motion working on positive ways to move the greyhounds that will no longer race. Responsible owners and trainers are also planning ahead to move the pets into adoption groups, and other racers to different tracks.

A post on the Dairyland Web site states: "Wisconsin State law provides that the greyhounds are to be adopted to new homes, sent to another racetrack for racing purposes or returned to their owners. Our kennel compound will remain open until all greyhounds are properly placed."

In a more recent development, Dairyland Greyhound Track owners recently announced a plan in which each kennel operator would be given \$5,000 as a way of making sure every dog is safely removed after the track closes for good.

The cash offer to each kennel operator - there are twelve kennels at the Kenosha track housing hundreds of dogs - was made after negotiations between track owners and state regulators. The dogs must be moved out by February 5.

This is an "all or nothing" offer, meaning *all* dogs from *all* kennels must be removed, or none will receive the money. With this sort of incentive in place, it seems likely all kennel owners will comply, but it also greatly reduces the window for adoptions.

Linda Cliffler is actively profiling the Dairyland dogs to provide their stats to groups. Linda and Sharon Palm already assembled a load of pets, and it made its way east on December 5.

Thanks to Sally Allen of USA Dog the thirty-three dogs traveled in style in a specially equipped bus. After stopping in Ohio for several groups, she was off to Erie Pennsylvania, where she met up with our Greyhound Action League volunteers. GAL then transported eleven dogs back to Buffalo. Four of those dogs are for GAL, five for GINA-Canada and two for GReAT-Buffalo. Volunteers from GAGR (Rochester) met in Erie and took eight dogs. Many groups are quickly trying to make room and raise funds for the unexpected extras, just trying to help out a Dairyland dog or two.

Despite GALs being a small organization the efforts of each volunteer is mighty. Their focus always remains first and foremost the dogs. Taking Action, one dog at a time, or in this case, four. If you'd like to help in any way, contact Laura at 867.9822.

The **Caring Paws** program of GAL involves a visit to a nursing home or health care facility where we and the hounds interact with the residents (and staff), sharing the rewards of greyhound ownership. If you are available during the daytime hours, please consider volunteering for an hour or two a month. The experience itself is very fulfilling and rewarding to bring a bit of joy to those who can no longer have and/or care for pets.

Our first “venue” is Lord of Life Adult Day Health Center located in Depew, NY which provides day care services for stroke recovery individuals, head trauma victims and frail elderly dementia clients. Volunteers from our program will be making a monthly visit on the second Wednesday of each month from 1:00 pm - 2:00 pm. I attended this facility with my two hounds, Bo & Marti on October 21st. The clients of the facility absolutely loved seeing and petting the dogs, some hugged them; yet others just stared with a far away look on their face as if they were remembering from a long, long time ago. The more able clients asked questions about the breed and owning them. Some of them told stories of their dogs from days

gone by. The staff of the facility took a high interest in the breed and ownership and asked a lot of questions. I handed out a few brochures to staff members and promised to bring more at my November visit. The Director also took a few pictures of some of the clients with the hounds to post in the activity room.

Our second “venue” has just been secured at The Courtyards Adult Home in Hamburg, NY, which is a residential assisted living facility for the aged. Volunteers from our program will be making a monthly visit on the last Wednesday of each month from 2:00 pm - 3:00 pm.

Upcoming dates for the next few months are 1/13/10, 2/10/10 and 3/10/10 at Lord of Life and 12/30/09 and 1/27/10 at The Courtyards. Please check our “Files” section of the digest in the near future as a third “venue” will be added.

Hounds coming to these types of facilities must not jump on people and not be bothered by wheelchairs or walkers or being the center of attention in a crowded room. Please also note that the floors in these two facilities are not carpeted; as such, your hound must not be “skiddish”.

Dear MKB, I am a recent retiree having been adopted this past summer. It will be my first holiday as a pet. Do you have any tips or suggestions for making this exciting season a safe and happy one for me?

Dear Erie, as a grey-mom myself, and having experienced several holidays these past years I do have some suggestions for your humans to keep in mind:

Avoid eating holiday foods. People food is not part of your regular diet and therefore could cause digestive upset or even pancreatitis.

Keep your schedule the same, routine is what has always worked best for you so keep as close to it as possible. This is especially important if you are traveling over the holidays.

Limit your time socializing. Although the family and friends are visiting ask your owner to provide you with some quiet time, whether it is in your crate, or gated off in a room off limits to adults and/or children.

Be aware of open doors, and gates. With visitors in the house or coming and

going the chance of a door or gate left open increases. Ask visitors to use the same door in and out and use baby gates if necessary to keep you safe.

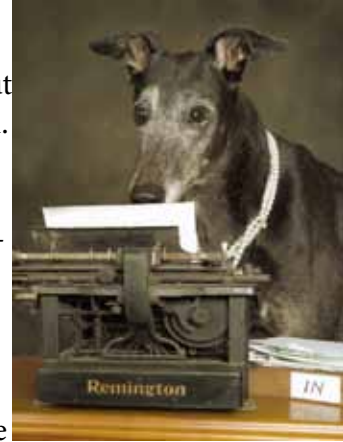
Christmas plants and decorations should be kept out of your line of sight and reach. You should be supervised around Christmas Trees so that you do not make the mistake of thinking it is indoor plumbing for dogs.

Also, decorations are not 'holiday toys' so take the time to work with your people and allowing them to redirect you to greyhound safe items.

Remember to make time for your people. Schedule a walk where you both can have some casual, relaxing time with each other.

It is the holidays, and it's about families...and you are a very important part of the family.

Lastly, be thankful. Be sure to bestow your people with a lot of extra love and attention, showing how grateful you are they are a part of your family.



A Tax Break for Pet Owners?

Animal Shelters nationwide have reported a sharp increase in abandoned or returned animals, many of which were cut loose by owners who can no longer afford their care. Rep. Thaddeus McCotter (R. Mich) has introduced a bill that would use the federal tax code to help.

Happy Act H.R.3501 – The Humanity and Pets Partnered Through the Years would allow pet owners to deduct the cost of food, veterinary care, and other pet-related expenses from their income taxes, up to \$3500.00 per year. McCotter says the bill would provide a tax relief for pet owners while at the same time strengthening “the human-animal bond.”

Leo Grillo, an animal-rights activist, says a tax break for the 60% of Americans who own pets will help keep pets in the home, where they contribute to the emotional well-being of families. “If Americans are happy and emotionally stable they are going to be more productive, and that helps the economy,” he says, adding that the bill also could ease the cost of local animal control services

Greyhounds are fast- the fastest dogs on the planet. It is a universally accepted fact, even if I'm forced to admit that I *am* a greyhound and my only experience has ever been *with* greyhounds. That also being a fact, my own speed is really nothing more than a relative estimate. I'll never forget the day, though, that I learned that I was fast, too- really fast.

My littermates and I were removed from the care of our mother when we were almost four months old. We could already run, of course, but we were meant for racing at the track, which would require training, discipline, and nearly fourteen more months.

When we arrived at the Texas ranch, we were barely out of puppyhood, still growing into our bodies, uncoordinated, with paws too big for our legs. The ranch seemed to stretch on endlessly, offering limitless possibilities to run, chase and play. For now, though, we had to learn the basics.

To progress to the next level, we needed to master two things: to tolerate wearing a muzzle and to walk on a lead. The importance of these things was drilled into our heads for many weeks. The trainers and the track did not have time and therefore would not tolerate dogs that proved to be unmanageable at this phase. I'm sorry to say that there were a couple of dogs for which this was the case. For the most part, however, we were treated well as we were also required to trust our human handlers.

Eventually, we graduated to drag lure training. This involved a pair of dogs released at the same time to chase a tanned coyote pelt attached to a line being retracted from 1500 feet away. You could never actually catch it, as its speed was controlled by a man at the other end. It was always just slightly out of reach. I was performing extremely well at this exercise, never being outrun. I was gaining confidence, but never really knew if I'd be good enough to race at the track. Perhaps I was just with a weak group. One day, however, something unusual happened.

He was called Nucla. He was a tall, mostly white dog with long legs, a patch of black over his left eye and ear, and a large black spot on his back. We had been hearing the trainers talk about him for weeks. "Fastest dog I ever saw" said one. He was a couple of months older and was almost through the 'whirligig' portion of his

training. A whirligig was a thirty foot boom arm that could spin in a circle. A dog in this phase must chase a lure attached to the end of the arm while running in that circle. Nucla was apparently terrific at it. A few weeks more of straight track simulated racing, and he would be off to the big race track.

On this particular morning, I was about to be set loose to chase the coyote pelt. Just behind me, Nucla and several other dogs were being escorted to the whirligig for their daily session.

The lure started to pull away when suddenly a scuffle broke out between two dogs in Nucla's group. His handler let go of his collar to break up the fight, and my handler, in an attempt to help, let go of mine.

I looked at the lure, which was still being dragged steadily across the field. I looked at Nucla, and to my surprise, Nucla was looking at me. We must have had the same idea, because we both took off to pursue the lure at the same time.

He *was* fast. He had started about ten feet behind me, but in two of his long strides we were neck and neck.

The man retracting the lure must have finally realized what happened, because it stopped about 300 yards away. I was running as fast as I could, faster than I thought I could, and about halfway to the lure I was ahead. I needed to know where Nucla was, so I snuck a peek over my shoulder. He was just slightly behind on my right. His eyes were focused intently, his movement powerful yet remarkably fluid even at that speed.

We were almost to the lure, and I had nothing more in my tank. In the last ten strides Nucla passed me and got to the lure first. He knew he would before we even started. I was only half a stride away when he got there, and I was satisfied in being that close to a dog that fast. I also learned that day that speed alone would not be enough to be a great racer. I had a great deal more to learn.

I had heard later that Nucla indeed was a great racer, at least for a while. In his twenty-third race, another dog wiped out around the second turn, causing a terrible collision involving three other dogs. Nucla had broken his spine and was put down a short while later. I won't forget his extraordinary power and elegant stature. No one else may remember him, but at least I do.

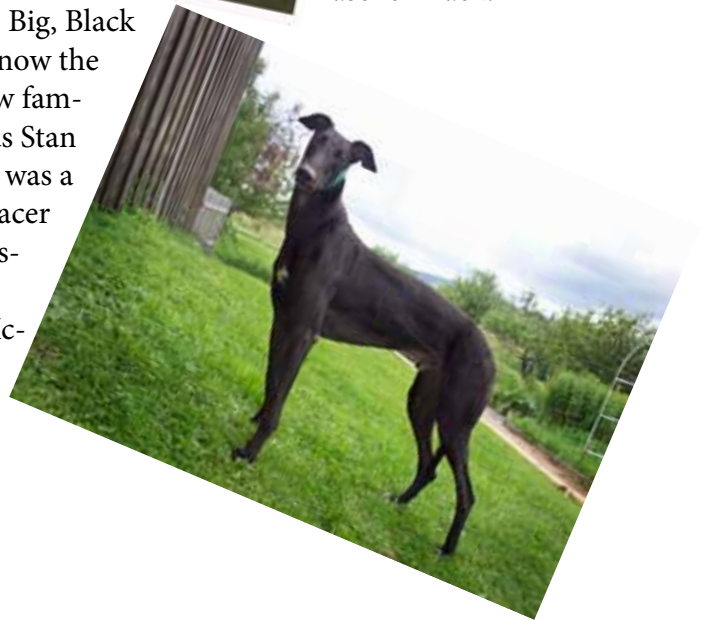
Leap To The-front

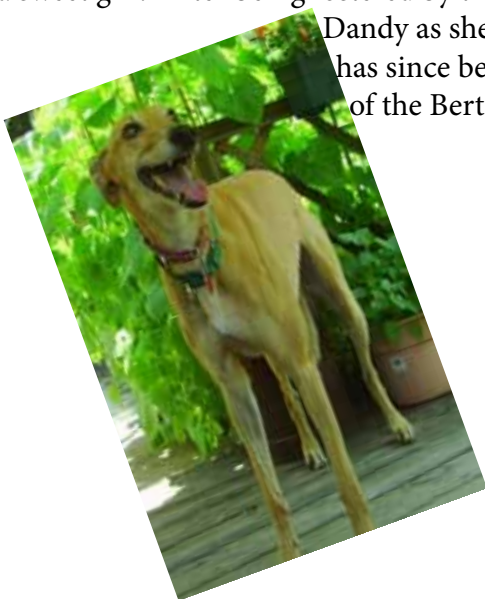
